They have been pleased with their children's progress. Kyle, now 2, can say his ABCs, and




"She's 4, and she can write her ABCs," Eric Hauser said. "She can count, write out certain words. She's doing real well."

Eventually, the couple plan to send their third child, due later this month, to Sunbeam as well, all in an effort to prepare their kids for public school.

"I've heard - I don't know if it's accurate — that the first five years of a kid's life, they kind of set up how they learn. Not just what they learn, but how they learn," Hauser said. "We've heard that helps. Our thought is, why take the chance? If it's not the case, she will not be behind, and there is a good chance she's going to be ahead."
